Cecil Community Centre is a not-for-profit, multi-service neighbourhood centre that offers a broad range of recreational, educational, social, cultural and capacity-building programs to local area residents. For more than 40 years, the Centre has played a vital role in the lives of community members of all ages. Our centre provides programs and services for children, youth, adults and seniors. Programs include EarlyON Child and Family Centre, Community Drop-in, Children's After School Program, Summer Camp and PA Day Camps, Breaking Barriers, Harm Reduction Services. The Centre is an accessible, multi-functional facility that provides program and activity spaces to the community at large.

Cecil Community Centre is an agency of the City of Toronto and one of the Association of Community Centres (AoCC). The AoCCs is comprised of 10 volunteer board-run, multi-purpose facilities providing a broad range of community, recreation and social service programs to residents in the local community.

Land Acknowledgement

Cecil Community Centre acknowledges that the sacred land on which this building stands has been a site of human activity for 15,000 years. This land is the traditional territory of many nations including the Mississaugas of the Credit, the Anishnabeg, the Chippewa, the Haudenosaunee and the Wendat peoples and is now home to many diverse First Nation, Inuit, and Métis Peoples. We also acknowledge that Toronto is covered by Treaty 13 signed with the Mississaugas of the Credit, and the Williams Treaties signed multiple Mississaugas and Chippewa Bands.

Today, the meeting place of Toronto is still home to many Indigenous people from across Turtle Island, and we are grateful to have the opportunity to work in the community, on this territory. We are also mindful of broken covenants and the need to strive to make right with all our relations. The original nations continue to cry out for justice. As treaty people, we commit to listen, learn and work toward justice and reconciliation.

Cecil Community Centre acknowledges all Treaty peoples – including those who came here as settlers – as migrants, either in this generation, or in generations past – and those of us who came here involuntarily, particularly those brought to these lands as a result of the Trans-Atlantic Slave Trade and Slavery. We pay tribute to those ancestors of African origin and descent.

What is a land acknowledgement and why do we do it?

A territorial or land acknowledgement involves making a statement recognizing the traditional territory of the Indigenous people(s) who called the land home before the arrival of settlers, and in many cases still do call it home. Indigenous peoples have been acknowledging the land at the start of gatherings, ceremonies and events for time immemorial. With the release of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission, more non-Indigenous people are becoming aware of the importance.

Providing a land acknowledgement at the beginning of an event or meeting gives time for reflection and demonstrates recognition of Indigenous lands, treaties and peoples. It involves thinking about what happened in the past and what changes can be made going forward in order to further the reconciliation process. Land acknowledgements mark a small and important step in the process of reconciliation and building a positive relationship with Indigenous peoples. By making a land acknowledgement we are taking part in an act of reconciliation, honouring the land and Indigenous presence which dates back over 10,000 years.

Using and participating in a land acknowledgement is a way to recognize the enduring presence and resilience of Indigenous peoples in this area for time immemorial. It is also a reminder that we are all accountable to these relationships.

At Cecil Centre, we acknowledge that Truth and Reconciliation will take time and significant effort. We also know that community space can be difficult and expensive to access. Throughout 2023, we continued to make our spaces available to indigenous organizations - free of charge, with no public acknowledgement - as a small step to offering support, as we thoughtfully seek to move forward on a path to reconciliation.

Family Resource Program

Throughout 2023, we provided additional support and knowledge to mothers, caregivers, extended families, single parents, and more. We used different strategies to help some children develop their social and emotional skills. Innovative communication methods enabled us to develop and deliver educational workshops and support programs for participants and enable parents/caregivers to give their children the best possible start to life. This includes a partnership with Public Health to deliver a series of workshops on stress management techniques.




Early ON Child and Family Centre

All CecilKids! programs are S.T.E.A.M (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, Math) based with an academic enrichment focus, encouraging creativity and physical activity while providing the opportunity to see the fun side of learning, make new friends, develop new skills and get homework when needed as well providing a healthy & nutritious snack daily.

We were able to reach over 20 new families in new registrations throughout the summer as we saw the number of attendants per week grow on a daily basis. By the 8th week of camp we reached our highest number of attendance in a single week for 2024, a grand total of 25 registrants! Several new thrilling trips were taken including but not limited to the the Ontario science Centre, Porter Airlines, the Olympic pool, Centre Island & local Cinema visits played a great hand in our memorable summer. The campers also had the opportunity to exercise their entrepreneurial skills with a Lemonade Stand which raised approximately over \$100 which the hardworking campers were later able to reward their hard-work with an ICE-CREAM PARTY!

The Youth Program offers a space for 13-19-year-olds to relax, work on homework, receive advice, play video games, learn about volunteer and job opportunities, participate in sports, ping pong, be mentored, and receive food, among other activities tailored to their interests.

This year, CecilYouth! was able to host 10 programs and events that attracted a number of new youths to the community centre. We were able to establish new youth events and programs, as well as a Girls Committee including over 20 youths, thanks to the formation of youth committee! They organized fresh projects, activities, and programs at Cecil, bringing in between 150 – 200 youths for the various events.

We were successful in drawing in between 80 and 100 individuals to our summer and fall community fairs to learn about community initiatives, volunteer opportunities, and other topics. Youth were able to connect with partners (YES, TPL, Neighbourhood Group, Woodgreen, UFT, City of Toronto) and find a variety of jobs and volunteer possibilities.

The Wednesday drop-in basketball program engaged over 30 youths each week to build friendships and stay active in a safe sapce. In CecilYouth! new cooking class, 10 youths acquired skills in food safety, cooking, and affordable meal preparation. Twenty percent of the students who completed Cecil's Leadership-in-Training (LIT) program graduated as mentors after receiving professional development seminars that helped them acquire employable skills.



Cecil Seniors

Theses are volunteer-run programs for seniors providing a variety of dances, sining and Tai Chi in a friendly, social environment. Approximately 160 seniors actively participate in a variety of programs at the Cecil Center, including Chinese Folk Dancing, Line Dancing, Friday and Sunday Tai Chi, Karaoke, Choir Groups, and Table Tennis. These activities foster community awareness and vitality. Furthermore, seniors engage in enrichment activities such as Summer Barbeque Parties, holiday celebrations, and wellness workshops.

The senior programs greatly contribute to the overall health and well-being of older adults, empowering them to actively participate in recreational activities. Through fostering community involvement and volunteerism, Cecil has expanded his influence within the Kensington Chinatown community, promoting social cohesion and enriching the lives of seniors.

This is the second home for some elderly people who are loyal service users here all year round.Senior volunteers, such as Elsa, Amy, Peggy, Wanda, Judy, Loreta, Melanie, and Mr. Guan who almost never miss volunteer work except for holidays and illness. We all have feelings for the Center.

English Conversation Circle

The conversation circle was designed from the ground-up in September, with placement students Hali, Polly, and Cynthia creating the content, facilitating the classes, and building rapport with the participants. As the weeks went on, the placement students better understood the language skills and needs of participants and designed the curriculum accordingly. By the end of 2023, English Conversation Circles were consistently attended by a group of 3-4 dedicated participants.

English Conversation Circle invited participants to practice their English speaking and comprehension skills by engaging in a structured discussion about various weekly themes. The themes were developed with the input of participants and included practical and relevant topics including visiting the doctor's office, booking a hotel, travelling, and making healthy choices. The intimate class size (~7-15 people) allowed participants to share parts of their life, particularly during the 'check in' at the beginning of every session, while developing their English skills in a welcoming and non-judgmental environment.







BREAKING

With the support of the United Way of Greater Toronto, the Breaking Barrier initiative had the following outputs for unhoused and precariously housed community members: 6 people housed, 21 housing ready, 15 clients were able to obtain Government benefits, ID and other documents, 16 newcomers were able to secure employment and housing, 5 evictions were avoided and 11 clients received peer counselling.

Harm Reduction

Towards the end of the summer, Cecil Centre initiated a Harm Reduction Program with the financial support of United Way Greater Toronto for. The program focuses on supporting community members who are substance users or are living in areas where substance use is prominent. The goal is to reduce the dangers for people who are drug users, create safe environments for people to use in their community, provide support where we can, and reduce stigma around substance use.

We have integrated quarterly community dinners, and a Holiday Celebration into our regular schedule of activities, and we are actively distributing Harm, Hygiene, and Cold Weather Kits to community members who need them.

It's always nice that I have a wonderful person that I can talk to about whatever is going on in my life. Also, Having access brand new socks and underwear has been a huge bonus, along with other miscellaneous personal care items. Above all, the thing I appreciate the most is Nathalie and without her the Breaking Barriers program would not be the same!"







Meal Program

YSM Evergreen Centre for Youth has been experiencing increased demand from adults for their lunch meal program on a daily basis. As a result, In September we began working with the Yonge Street Mission to distribute hot lunches, and dinners during the week.

This new project was supported by Community Development (staff and students), and community volunteers.

Warming Centre

Since Monday, January 30th,2023 we worked with our partners at Christie Ossington Neighbourhood Centre and the City of Toronto, Shelter Support & Housing Administration, to activate six warming centres (covering 23 days), 35 beds, providing a safe, warm space, with meals and referrals to almost 690 homeless neighbours.

Strategic Initiatives

Strategic Initiatives and Resource Development had an exciting year.

We started the New Year with a resolution to address the social determinants of nealth. As Cecil is committed to housing as a social determinant of health we worked with our local City Councillor, Dianne Saxe, the City of Toronto's Shelter Support, Housing Division to and Christie Ossington Neighbourhood Centre to be the site for Toronto's 4th Warming Centre from January to April, 2023.

Working with Toronto Public Health, and the University Health Network throughout the winter, and spring, we also hosted Covid-19 Testing, Treatment and Vaccination clinics (for Covid, Flu, and Mpox) focusing on newcomer, refugee, senior, unhoused, and other vulnerable communities. We also hosted an Open Doors Health Fair, with Access Alliance Multicultural Health, and the Mid Toronto, Ontario Health Teams.

This fair provided blood pressure checks, information on cancer screening, chronic disease prevention, mental health and wellness promotion, and sun safety along with a pop-up Family Clinic so that children, teens, and young adults could keep up with their Tetanus, Polio, MMR, and Diphtheria vaccines.

Strategic Initiatives, and Resource Development were also very busy on the arts, and culture front. On April 30th Cecil was the site for an International Conference, on Co-Design, and Community Animation. Speakers on "ground up" place making from our Auditorium to community centres were "zoomed" around the world. (Pretty cool eh?), and our work with Toronto Metropolitan University is now considered a success story in collaborative urban planning.

Throughout the summer we worked with our partners at the Bike Brigade, Fort York Food Bank, the Mazon Foundation, Scadding Court, and Toronto Climate Action transfer, and mobilize knowledge and action on container gardening. Together we transported hundreds, and hundreds of seedings, many pounds, of soil, dozens of containers of compost to the Fort York, and other Foodbanks across the Downtown West all using "peddle power", and bike trailers.

In October we celebrated the very large zucchini harvest from the Cecil Garden with a Mid-Autumn Festival Mooncake, and Art Making Day. This intergenerational event connected Cecil with more than 150 new community members of all ages, and stages.





RAISING FUNDS IS ESSENTIAL

Despite receiving core financing from the City, all program, service, and strategic initiative funds must be %100 raised independently. We continued to crowdfund in 2023 year successfully raising:

\$3,500 to our Send-A-Kid-To-Camp

\$500 to our Winter Warmth funds

Thanks to our donors, funders, participants, and partners for making 2023 a truly great year for Strategic Initiatives.

CecilVenues Your Memorable Event Experience

2023 was an amazing year at CecilVenues. We grossed almost \$100K and netted \$59,560 after paying our Event Crew and investing in capital purchases, which included a new Bar, a new AV system, and Wash Lights to decorate the space. The Metcalf Foundation is funding CecilVenues for 2024-25 providing our Social Enterprise with a \$148K Grant.

The CecilVenues Event Crew has grown over time to the size of 7 Crew members, with 4 members being a longer term which has helped transfer knowledge to our new hires. The crew has grown in skillsets through both onsite events and training programs that we have supported them through such as First Aid & CPR and SmartServe.

CecilVenues income is essential to supporting all of Cecil's Community Programs, Services, and Strategic Initiatives while contributing \$25K to Cecil Unrestricted Revenues Fund to be used for innovation in 2023.



In 2023, the Centre earned a total income of **\$1,457,245**, representing an 18% increase over 2022. This represents marked increases in City of Toronto funding and, event space rentals through the CecilVenues Social Enterprise.

The total administrative expenditures increased by 15% from **\$883,258** in 2022, to **\$1,014,169**.

Total program revenues increased by 25.4% from **\$353,480** in 2022 to **\$443,076** in 2023.

In 2022, expenses increased by 45.4%, from \$287,126 to \$417,407 in 2023, resulting in a lower surplus in 2023 of **\$25,669** compared to **\$66,354** in 2022.


